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

VIEW FROM THE BALCONY

I have served on the Old Stagecoach Stop board for many years and have served as Vice President and also Secretary. Taking on the office of President was never my ambition. I know that leading is far more difficult than following but now I find myself in that position. As I take on the role, my thoughts go to **Maxine Farnham** and how much I looked up to her. I do this as much for her as for the Foundation.

Maxine was an extraordinary woman. Were it not for her courage and foresight, coupled with the support of her husband, we might have no reason for this newsletter or the OSS Foundation. It was through the effort of Gene and Maxine that the rundown building on the square was saved from the wrecking ball. Since that time, she never faltered. Maxine's commitment and support for the OSS never waivered. As I think of her, which I often do, three words come to mind.

She was a **matriarch**, one of the elders or leading older members in a community. She was a **preservationist**, meaning to keep alive, to make lasting, to keep safe from harm. She was a **leader**, meaning to go before, to show the way, to conduct by guiding, to influence, to have top position or first place.

I believe that these words certainly described Maxine, and feel that those in our community who knew her, would agree.

In her last years, she found it difficult to participate as a board member, but she was always our advisor and an integral part of our board process and decisions.

Upon her death in 2010, the family named the OSS as the recipient of donations in her honor. We used the funds to make some major improvements.

The first was to make a change to the front entry to the building. An old photo showed the concrete steps leading from the sidewalk to each front door and also side banisters. With approval from the city, we poured the new concrete steps and added the side banisters. The second was to completely redo the archaeology display. The old display cases were removed, the walls repainted, the floor sanded, new glass front wall cabinets installed, plus a new TV and picture displays. Thanks to **Brown Woodworking** for building our cabinets, and **Terry Primas** for the restoration work with some help from **Hill and Lane Construction**. Thanks also to **Jerry Barnabee** for help removing the old cases. Stop by and see how much better it tells our archaeology story.

ON STAGE

Maxine Farnham was a person of passions and talents. Thankfully for us involved with OSS, one of them was history, particularly local history. Maxine was of pioneer stock. Her father's great grandfather, Jesse Ballew, was one of a handful of early settlers in that large early Pulaski County. He built a log cabin in 1820 on the east bank of the Gasconade near what is now Hazelgreen. When new counties were formed from the original large Pulaski, the Ballew homestead wound up just west of the Pulaski/Laclede line. Jesse Ballew is acknowledged as the first white settler of what is now Laclede County.

During the Civil War, Maxine's ancestors on her mother Molly's side, the Carvers, settled a couple miles south of Wheeler's Mill on the Gasconade, southeast of Crocker. This area became known as Sweet Home, after the school of that name. Mart Ballew was one of the teachers. Consider that if Mart had pursued his teaching career closer to his home place, he would not have met the Carver family and daughter Molly at Sweet Home.

Maxine grew up steeped in county history and civil and civic affairs. Her father, Mart, was elected Circuit Clerk and Recorder when

she was three years old. Mart succeeded Wood Carver, a relative of Maxine's mother, Molly. Wood later served as county sheriff. Maxine spent many afternoons as a child in her father's office at the courthouse and as a teenager helped him with his workload. Those experiences instilled not only an interest but a prodigious knowledge about the county's history and people.

But her interest in history wasn't just academic or passive. She was also an activist, particularly in the case of the Old Stagecoach Stop. Her catalytic efforts in saving that oldest county structure resulted in its preservation. Terry and I came to appreciate Maxine's knowledge and talents when we became involved with the Old Stagecoach Stop Foundation. When working on a display or an article, confusion over an event or fact often occurred. The remedy was always the same: "Go see Maxine." Not only would we get the fact cleared up, but, most often we got the historical context to go with it. One such incident occurred when we had questions about the native stone building on Rt. 66 in the county. Terry was sure that one of the buildings had been overlooked as a vintage roadside structure. We asked Maxine about the rock building in west Waynesville that is now an

insurance office. Did she know anything about it? She responded, "Oh sure. That was originally the Roubidoux Gardens, a restaurant. My father and Warren Wyrick had Vern Pruitt build it for them." Vern Pruitt was the master stonemason of Stoneydell fame.

One of our best memories was taking Maxine to St. Louis to get Midwest Living magazine's preservation award some years

ago. When she accepted the award on behalf of the foundation, in typical Maxine fashion, her acceptance remarks were all about the efforts of other people and downplaying her own role.

Maxine's life was exemplary in so many ways. She certainly motivated us toward our interest in local history. She did her ancestors proud.
