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
We'll have our popular feature programs, Mews by Allicat and More Scandal, in a moment but first our lead story.

Lost, a white eversharp. If found return to Florence Hammock or "Puggy" Hensley.


And that's the way it is, The Tiger Rag for January 17, 1939. As everyone knows, our paper is published "Once in a while" so join us the next time for the next edition.
