NATIONAL NOTABLE EVENTS


On February 8, 1922, **President Warren G. Harding** (right) installed the first radio in the White House. He had the further distinction of being the first President to be heard on radio when he delivered a speech at the dedication of the Francis Scott Key Memorial at Fort McHenry on June 14 over Baltimore radio station WEAR.




The *Reader's Digest* was founded on February 5 by DeWitt and Lila Bell Wallace in Chappaqua, New York. While recovering from wounds received in World War I, DeWitt had the idea of condensing articles from several magazines and combining them into one publication. By 1929, it had a circulation of 290,000 subscribers in the United States.



The **Lincoln Memorial** was dedicated on May 30. Construction began in March of 1914 with the exterior building material being Colorado marble. The original plan for the statue of a seated Lincoln called for a 10-foot-tall likeness, but the huge interior hall would have made the figure seem diminutive. Plans were revised and the Georgia white marble sculpture was enlarged to 19 feet from head to foot, weighing 150 tons. Also present at the dedication was Lincoln's only surviving son, 78-year-old Robert Todd Lincoln (left). The memorial is a stop on the itinerary of more than 7 million visitors each year.



After ten years of excavating in Egypt's Valley of the Kings, British archaeologist **Howard Carter** uncovered the sealed tomb of King Tutankhamen on November 4. The fact that the door was still sealed indicated it had not been discovered by grave robbers during its 3,200 years of existence. He notified his rich backer, the Earl of Carnarvon. On November 26, Carnarvon was standing by when Carter drilled a small hole in the door and inserted a candle. Carnarvon asked if he could see anything and Carter replied, "Yes, wonderful things."


BIRTHS

Betty White was born on January 17 in Oak Park, Illinois. Betty began her seven-decade show business career in radio but transitioned easily to the new television medium. She was the first woman to both produce and star in a television show, the sitcom *Life with Elizabeth*. She has often been referred to as "the First Lady of Television."



comedian with partner Mel Brooks, movie producer and director, and author of more than 20 books. He is probably best known as the writer of and actor in the 1960s sitcom *The Dick Van Dyke Show*.

Judy Garland, born Francis Gumm on June 10 in Grand Rapids, Michigan. Her show business career began as a singer on the vaudeville circuit with her sisters Mary Jane and Dorothy. The act was known as the Gumm Sisters. She achieved fame as Dorothy in the 1939 film *The Wizard of Oz*. She starred in a string of successful movies and was the first woman to win a Grammy for Best Album of the Year (1962).




Norman Lear, writer and producer, was born on July 27 in New Haven, Connecticut. He has created numerous 1970s sitcoms, including *All in the Family*, *Maude*, and *Good Times*.

DEATHS

Nellie Bly, the pen name of Elizabeth Cochran, died in New York City on January 27. Bly was a pioneering investigative journalist. She faked insanity and entered the Women's Lunatic Asylum in 1887 to report on its abuses for Joseph Pulitzer's newspaper *New York World*. She also captured the public's attention in 1889 with her trip around the world to beat the fictional journey of Phileas Fogg in *Around the World in Eighty Days*. Nellie circumnavigated the globe alone in 72 days, sending dispatches along the way.



Alexander Graham Bell, who patented the first practical telephone and co-founded the American Telephone and Telegraph Company, died in Nova Scotia of complications from diabetes. He was 75 years old.



Carl Reiner was born in the Bronx, New York on March 20, with a career in show business also spanning seven decades. He served in World War II and was trained as a French interpreter but spent the last two years with Special Services entertaining troops in the Pacific theater. Carl was a comedy writer, actor, stand-up
