Dr. R.E. Howlett Pioneer Doctor

One of the area's more famous pioneer doctors was R. E. Howlett, who was born in Otterville, Missouri, on January 15th, 1870.

In his young manhood he chose the medical profession for his life career and attended Beaumont College (which later became St. Louis University). He graduated with his degree in 1891 at the age of 21.

That was the same year he married Margaret Reed of Cooper County, Missouri. Shortly afterward, the couple come to this part of Missouri, settling at Nebo, where he practiced his medical profession for a number of years in Laclede and Pulaski Counties. Their marriage produced five children.

Margaret died in 1922. A few years later, Dr. Howlett married Effie Adkison from Laclede County. Three children were born during this marriage--Roy, Clay, and Margaret.

Dr. Howlett died on June 4th, 1949, at the age of 79.
