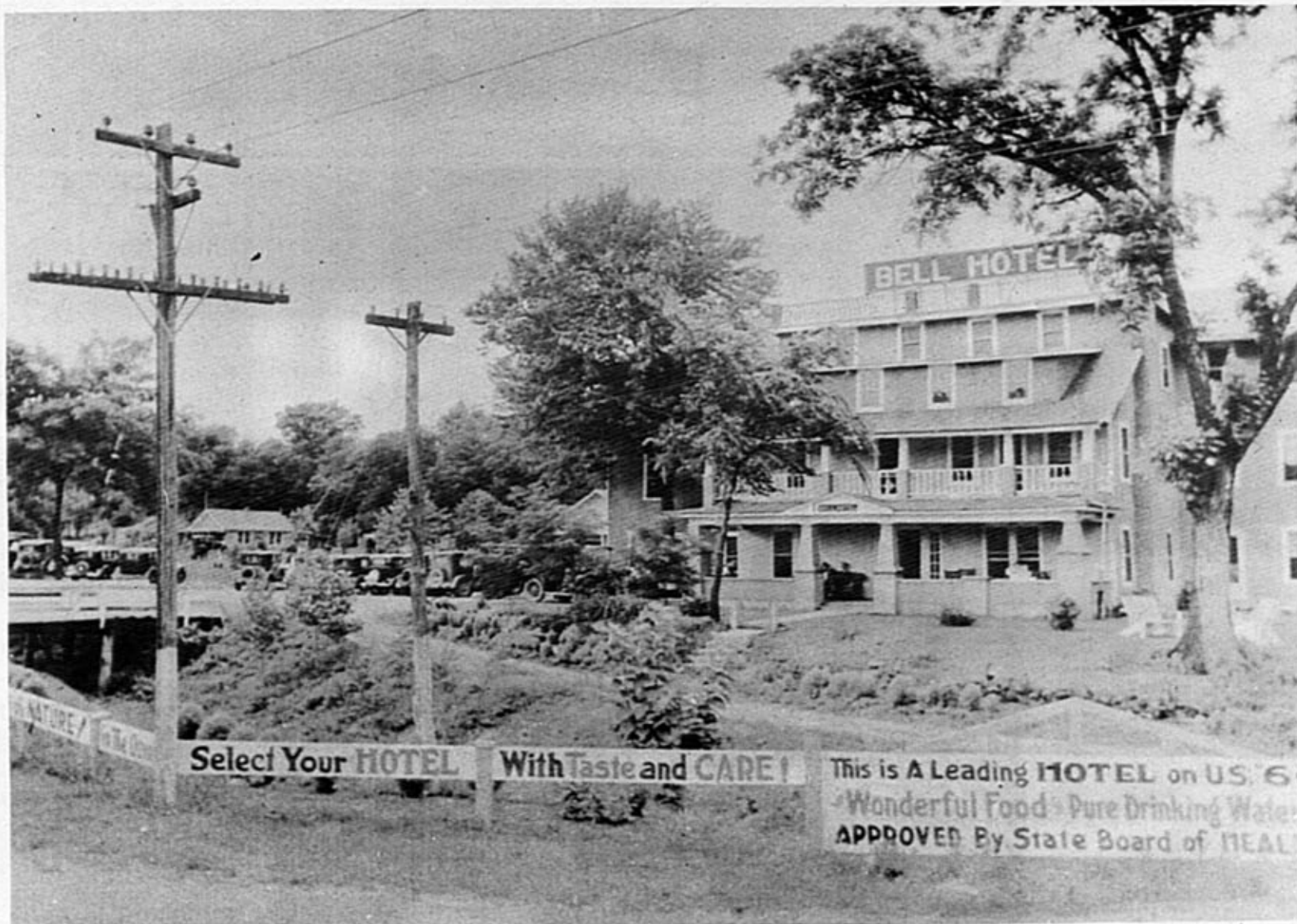

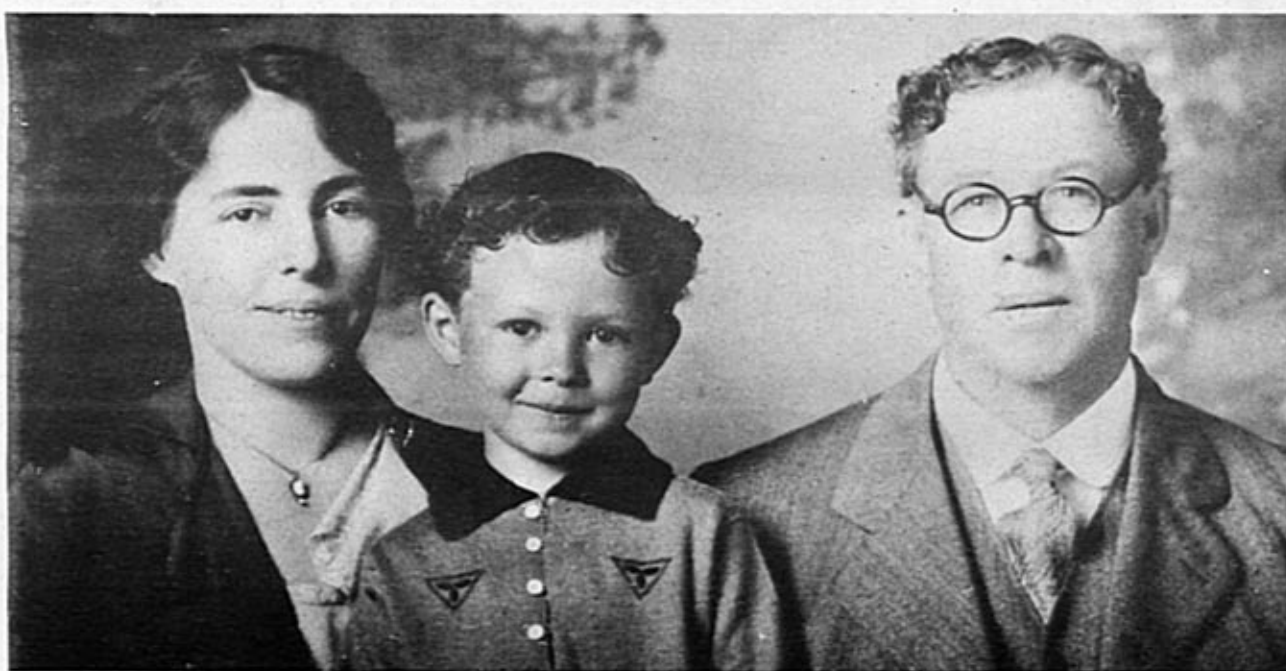

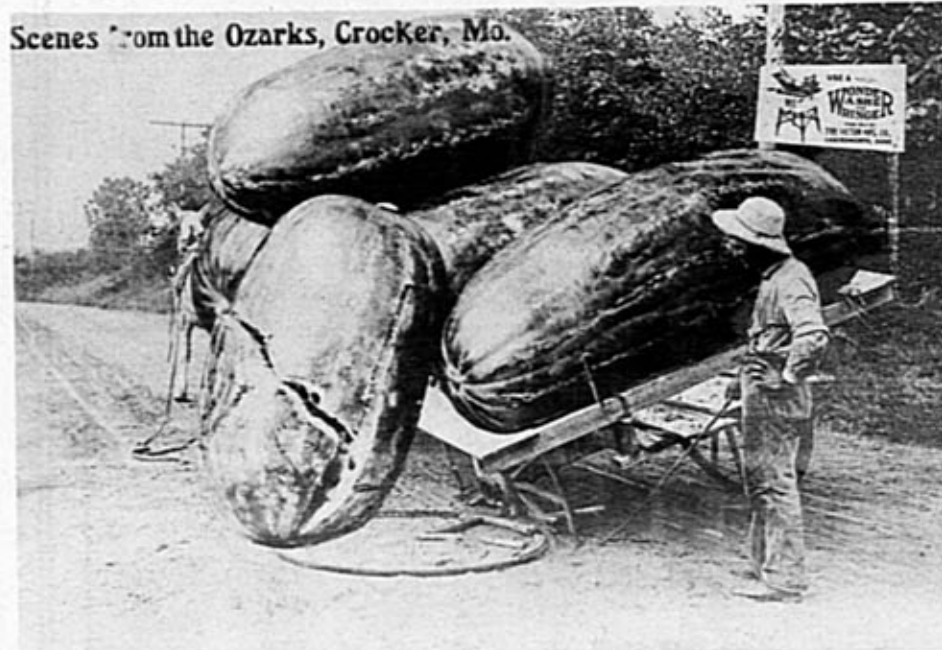

## VOLUME THREE IS PLANNED OF PULASKI COUNTY HISTORY

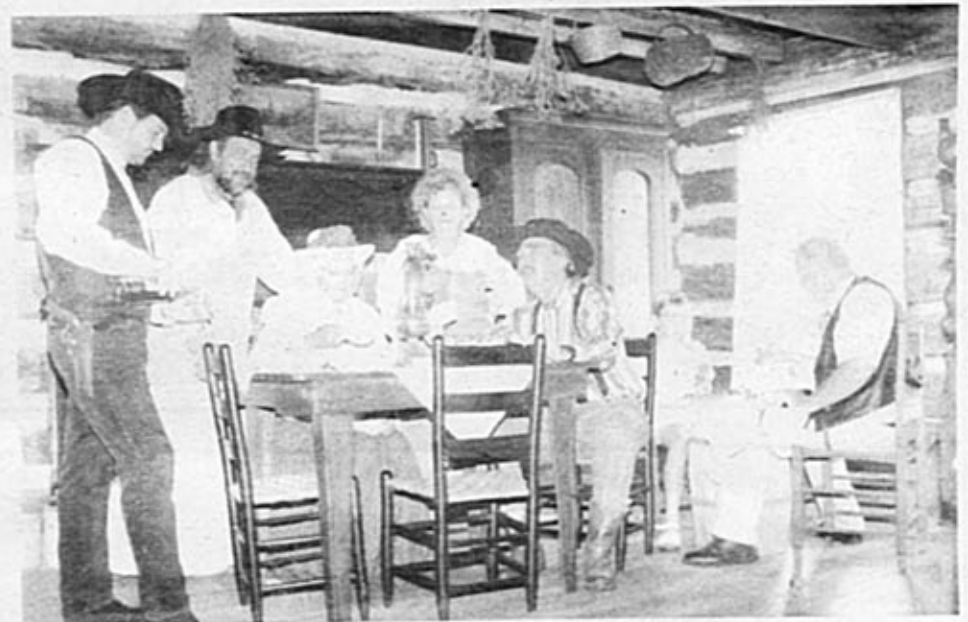
